

Primary Art Lesson Plan: Shape

Objective: Students will explore the concept of shape in art by listening to a story and creating their own artwork inspired by the characters from Tully's Alpine Adventure

Materials Needed:

- - Book: Tully's Alpine Adventure
- - Paper
- - Crayons, markers, or colored pencils
- - Scissors and glue (optional)

Introduction:

Begin by reading aloud a portion of Tully's Alpine Adventure. Introduce the main characters: Tully the playful Golden Doodle, Wooliam the soft lamb stuffie, and Lambkin the real lamb. Ask students to notice the different shapes they see in the illustrations (circles, ovals, triangles, rectangles).

Guided Practice:

After the story, show examples of shapes and how they can be combined to make pictures. For example, a circle for Tully's head, ovals for his paws, and triangles for mountains. Invite students to describe how shapes could be used to create Wooliam and Lambkin.

Activity:

Students will create their own picture of Tully, Wooliam, and Lambkin using shapes. They can draw and color the shapes, cut them out and glue them, or trace them from shape templates. Encourage creativity while focusing on how shapes come together to form characters and scenery.

Closing:

Have students share their artwork with the class. Discuss what shapes they used to create Tully, Wooliam, and Lambkin. Reinforce that shapes are the building blocks of art.

Assessment:

Observe students' participation during the discussion and their ability to use shapes in their artwork to represent the story's characters and setting.
